## **Food Programs—Food Pantry**

As the largest Food Pantry in Kenosha County, we offer families emergency supplemental groceries.

11,752 { Households served from our Food Pantry. (Approximately one million pounds of food.)



▲ We provided 11,053 Senior Boxes (CSFP) for the year for low-income seniors.

## **Shelter Programs—Emergency Family Shelter**

Emergency Family Shelter (EFS) provides shelter for individuals experiencing homelessness who have minor children. We know that families that stay together, grow together. Our family shelter has eight individual rooms as well as a full size kitchen, bathroom, laundry facilities and a playground.

#### **EMPLOYEE SPOTLIGHT**

## **Shelter Programs—Individual Shelter**

Individual Shelter (INNS) is dormitory style with separate space for men and women with a shared common area. We have a kitchenette, bathrooms, laundry facilities, lounge room, and outdoor gazebo.

26,375 Shelter nights of sleep provided in our two shelters.

#### CELEBRATE SUCCESS

D. was looking for a better way forward for herself and her new son. As she held her sleeping boy, D. explained to the Family Case Manager that she had never had her own place to live. **Our Housing Support Services** Program helped. D. find, apply, and obtain an apartment that kept her rent at 30% of her AGI.

To get her started, Shalom Center supplied D. with basic home living supplies through our Shalom-to-Home Program and food from our Pantry plus a bedroom set for her son.

Shalom also helped her find a job at a daycare center where she could also take her son.

Through the Shalom Center Housing Support Services Program, D. has a Housing Case Manager who meets with her often to continue supporting her success in her new home.

## **Administration and Support**

The administration and support team helps Shalom Center operate smoothly and efficiently. A combination of staff, volunteers and SER workers keep our management and general expenses down.














